

Christmas Traditions in Africa!


Here in the U.S., it can be easy to get lost in the busyness and clutter of the holidays. With that in mind, we thought we'd offer a glimpse of how Christmas is celebrated less encumbered throughout Africa.

In **Egypt**, Coptic Christians celebrate Christmas on January 7 -- after 43 days of fasting! On Christmas Day, families share a meal which consists of meat and rice, and spend the day visiting friends and neighbors. **Ethiopians** also celebrate Christmas on January 7. It begins with a day of fasting, followed by a church service and a family feast. On this day, Ethiopians wear a Shema, a handwoven garment made of white cotton with different decorative embroideries. On December 25, **Ghanaians** not only celebrate Christmas but also honor midwives. According to folk tales in Ghana, a midwife named Anna assisted at the birth of Jesus in Bethlehem and also helped save Baby Jesus from King Herod!

Borehole well provides new life for people of Bwari!

"Our goal at the mission here in Bwari is to establish a new pastoral center as well as provide assistance for the people in need," Fr. John Olayiwola, M.Afr., writes. "But without a source of fresh water, our efforts could only go so far. Thanks to the grant from the Missionaries of Africa, we have been able to drill a new borehole as well as install a pump, pipes, and faucets so that everyone in the nearby community can have access to clean water."

New school desks for children in rural Uganda!

The Little Shepherds Nursery and Primary School in Rutunguru was founded by the Daughters of Our Lady of Fatima as an outreach to help children of poor families begin to get the education they need. But the community was so poor that no one could help the Sisters purchase desks for the students. As a result, the boys and girls were sitting on paper and plastic bags to do their school work. Needless to say, when bugs and insects began crawling on the children, focusing on studies became increasingly difficult.

"The families here were too poor to buy anything for the school," Sr. Jacinta Kasande explains. "But thanks to the generosity of your benefactors, we were able to buy desks and chairs for the school! What a difference this is making in

so many lives. Thank you for all that you are doing!"

New school building is making a huge difference for children in Rwanda!

"Families in the surrounding villages kept asking us to build a school for their children," Fr. Simplice Traore, M.Afr., writes. "There was nothing here for them and they needed an education! We could not afford to build a new facility and the only place big enough was an abandoned structure. Also, the community is very poor so we did not have the funds to make the necessary renovations. Charitable IRA Rollover

What is a Charitable IRA Rollover?

 Charitable IRA Rollover is a permanent provision in the U.S. tax code for donors age 70½ or older to make a tax-wise gift to non-profit organizations, including the *Missionaries of Africa*.

Benefits of Charitable IRA Rollovers

- Satisfies requirements for annual minimum IRA withdrawals.
- Avoids federal and in some cases, state income tax.*
- Provides vital and ongoing support to the Missionaries and their missions in Africa.

Guidelines

- Donors age 70¹/₂ or older at the time of distribution.
- Gifts must be transferred directly from your IRA account to the *Missionaries of Africa*.
- Charitable gifts up to \$100,000 can be given each year.

How to make a Charitable Gift?

• Donors should contact their IRA Bank or broker/administrator to request an IRA distribution transfer to the *Missionaries of Africa*. Instruct your administrator to issue a check to:
