

After a series of traumatic events that befell his family during the 1870s, Horatio
Spafford turned to poetry. "It is well; it is well with my soul," he wrote expressing his

overwhelming grief. The poem has since become one of the most influential and enduring expressions of human sorrow, used in various Christian fellowships across the world. The lyrics evoke the tragedy of death, the grief of separation, the hope and, especially, the anticipation of eternal life when we are reunited with our loved ones.

Celebrating All Souls' Day

Each year on November 2nd, many Christians (including Roman Catholics, Anglicans, and Eastern Orthodox) observe *The Commemoration* of All the Faithful Departed, also known as "All Souls' Day." We are encouraged to pray for those who have died, especially our loved ones. The prayers offered for these souls assist in expediting the process of preparing them to be in God's Divine Presence. We recognize that few of us ever achieve perfection in this life and, therefore, we die still carrying our tendencies toward human imperfection. The Catholic Church, for example, teaches that "all who die in God's grace and friendship, but still imperfectly purified, are indeed assured of their eternal salvation; but after death, they undergo purification so as to achieve the holiness necessary to enter the joy of heaven." It is important to recognize that this purging (or "Purgatory") is not a state of punishment but rather a period of cleansing. On November 2, remember your deceased loved ones by lighting a candle, attending a church service, or making a charitable donation in their memory. New Solar Panels for Health Center!

In many parts of rural Africa, having a reliable source of electricity is a challenge. Even if service is available, entire communities can still experience *brown-outs* or even a complete loss of power for days on end. Because of this, medical clinics and health centers such as St. Joseph's Health Center in Kisoro, Uganda, are often forced to rely on gas powered generators to keep the lights on and medical equipment operating. But the cost of fuel for running these generators can make them expensive!



"Because of the need to keep life-saving equipment functioning, we do not have the option of not having



power," explains Sr. Maria Tumuheirwe, DOLF, a missionary working at the health center. "Because of your financial support, we have been able to purchase solar panels and batteries to keep all of our equipment running. So many lives are being touched by your generosity! No longer do we have to be concerned about losing power and lives being lost as a result of that. God bless you for everything you are doing for the poor."


Clean Water for Secondary School

When the Religious Brothers at the SCIM Polytech Secondary School needed water for their students, they weren't sure where to turn. "We knew that we had to find a source of clean water," explains Brother Barnabas Masagamasi, SCIM, headmaster of the school. "But we did not know where we would get the funds to pay for drilling a new well. So much of the water around here is contaminated; it is not safe for us to use. It carries diseases such as typhoid and cholera. We were hoping that you would help us ... and you did!"

Charitable IRA Rollover

What is a Charitable IRA Rollover?

• Charitable IRA Rollover is a permanent provision in the U.S. tax code for donors age 70½ or older to make a tax-wise gift to non-profit organizations such as the Missionaries of Africa.

Benefits of Charitable IRA Rollovers

- Satisfies requirements for annual minimum IRA withdrawals.
- Avoids federal and in some cases, state income tax.*
- Provides vital and ongoing support to the Missionaries and their missions in Africa.

Guidelines

- Donors age 70 $\frac{1}{2}$ or older at the time of distribution.
- Gifts must be transferred directly from your IRA account to the Missionaries of Africa.
- Charitable gifts up to \$100,000 can be given each year.

How to make a Charitable Gift?

 Donors should contact their IRA Bank or broker/administrator to request an IRA distribution transfer to the Missionaries of Africa. Instruct your administrator to issue a check to
